In 2017, the archive of the Tavistock Institute was launched at the library at Wellcome Collection and was the centrepiece of TIHR's 70th Festival Reimagining Human Relations in Our Time making 70+ years' heritage available to practitioner, scholarly and public users alike, for the first time.

Since its launch, the TIHR archive has been frequently consulted by library users and continues to resonate with the present day work of evaluation, research and consultancy at the Institute.

- What are the dynamics, thoughts, feelings that are thrown up by delving into the Institute's history?
- What can we all learn from the archive and how might it influence our work?

The Tavistock Institute's archive provides a comprehensive record of the formation, establishment, and development of the Tavistock Institute, charting the emergence of integrated multi-disciplinary research in the social sciences and organisational design in the twentieth and 21st centuries.

These papers document the working methods and processes of this pioneering group of social scientists, including anthropologists and psychoanalysts. The archive contains lively and reflective traces of their methodological workings and practices in key industrial and organisational projects.
